- Show Open to All. Exceptions specified.
  - All Exhibits for Competition must be entered with the Secretary not later than Saturday, 14th APRIL, 1945, accompanied by Entrance Fee, and delivered at the Bream Creek Hall before 10 a.m. on the day of Exhibition.
  - Each Exhibit to have Movable Tickets attached, with Name of Exhibitor, Number of Section, and Class of Exhibit.
  - All Exhibits for Prizes must be the growth or the work of the Exhibitor, and must be certified to as such if requested, and must have no distinguishing mark. (This Rule does not apply to Flowers for Bouquets, etc., or to Live Stock.)
  - Entrance Fee, 3d., where prize is 4s. or under; 6d. above 4s. and not exceeding 7s. 6d.; and 1s. for all prizes above 7s. 6d., except where otherwise specified.
  - The Judges may award Prizes of less value than those fixed by the Committee, or may withhold them altogether if they do not consider the Exhibit worthy of them. No second prize will be awarded in classes having less than three entries, and no third prize in classes having less than six entries.
  - If only one entry in any class, 1st prize card awarded and half prize money.
  - Subscribers of 10s. or over will receive a Family Ticket. Subscribers of 5s. and up to 10s. will receive a Single Ticket.
  - Any protest entered must be accompanied by one-third value of the prize, and if deemed frivolous the deposit will be forfeited.
  - The decisions of the Judges shall in all cases be final.
  - All Exhibits to be removed by the day following the Show, or forfeited to the Committee.
  - All prize money to be claimed within one month of Show or forfeited to Show Committee.
  - All Competitors must pay at the gate.
  - No Exhibit to be removed before 4 p.m.
- The following gentlemen will receive entries: Messrs. Neil Woolley (Copping), Vic. Woolley (Kellevie), and A. H. Hunt (Sorell).
- The Committee purpose opening the Show at 12 noon and closing it at 3.45 p.m. At this time (3.45 p.m.) everyone must leave the Hall, and Exhibitors Only will be allowed in at 4 p.m. to collect their Exhibits.
- The Committee would be very pleased to receive any Exhibits for Sale on behalf of the Show Patriotic Fund.
- Articles to be handed to Stewards at 4 p.m. and sold immediately afterwards by auction.
